Endless is the Victory

Forgiveness (Part 1)

Since we are forgiven, it is important that we first learn to forgive.

Nelson Mandela believed in freedom. He is credited with bringing freedom to South Africa but first he needed to be free from hate in his own heart. He learnt to forgive.

Rory Steyn was the body guard to Nelson Mandela. Rory believed in freedom too - but only for a part of the culture that he grew up in. Rory believed in Apartheid. He did not like Mandela and so it was a most unusual when Mandela selected Rory to be his personal body guard for the five years of his presidency. Rory was trained to act first and think later.

Rory separated his beliefs from his job. He did not believe anything that Mandela was saying - he just did his job. In those days, apartheid was infused into every stratum of South African Society. Rory grew up with it. The media was controlled by it. The schools' curricula was controlled by it.

"I thought Mandella was a fake" he said. "I watched over him **but** I also **watched** him - I watched for the **façade** to crumble", he said.

Rory was in charge of security as Nelson Mandela prepared to attend his own inauguration - an event where 184 Presidents and Royalty were waiting for him to arrive. Nelson pushed at the car door and struggled to get out. It was an armoured car and the door was very heavy so another policeman assisted Mandela. Rory takes up the story -

"Madiba (Nelson Mandela) gets out and doesn't say a word. He walked across to an old school Police Colonel who was standing there in his full blue uniform. You could see the Colonel's eyes getting bigger as Madiba got closer to him. "Madiba stops in front of him, puts out his hand and shakes his hand. He told him: 'Colonel. I just wanted to tell you that there is **no more you and us**. You are **our** police. I **am your president**.' This guy just started crying, tears streaming down his face. Madiba just patted him on the shoulder and told him it would be all right. "There was no press there, no PR opportunity, just a handful of security guys watching. That's the day I began to question 32 years of education (in the old South Africa) about what was correct. I didn't believe (Madiba) when he came out of jail that we were one country. Then I saw that exchange, it changed me forever." said Rory. "It was as if Madiba said - 184 of the world's leaders can wait while I take the time to get out of the car and talk to one colonel. This was the time that I realised that I would be prepared to take a bullet for Mandela. For the first time in my life I was free of Apartheid".

In that moment, Mandela also taught Rory about forgiveness.

"Everyone on Earth should say thank you to Nelson Mandela. Thank you for what you taught us. Thank you for teaching us to forgive. Thank you for teaching us that to talk to your enemy is always going to be superior to fighting with him". - Rory Steyn

It is astounding that God not only forgives: He forgets.



2018 Naplan Results: Wollondilly Anglican College

Our College Community congratulates our Year 3 and Year 5 students on their excellent NAPLAN results.

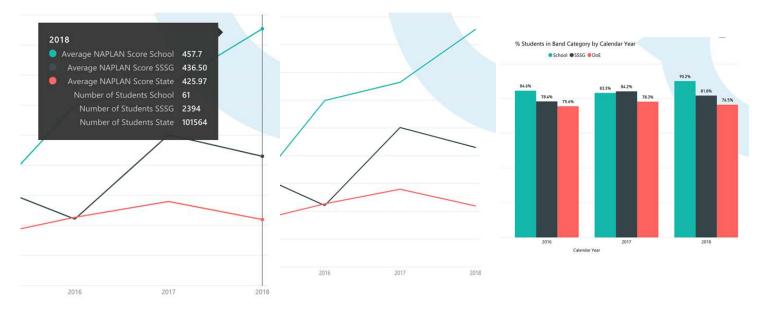
Year 3

Our College had 55 students in Year 3 sai NAPLAN online in 2018. It is very pleasing to note that:

- as a group, students in Year 3 achieved significantly higher than State averages for every area measured.
- 14% of Year 3 students achieved a Band 9 or 10.
- 90% of Year 3 students achieved in the top two bands for Year 3 level. (Bands 5&6)
- The Year 3 overall results have continued to increase. sitting significantly higher then State.

Explicit instructional approaches continue to be our focus moving forward, as we look to consolidate and build on growth in this area. The growth since implementing these strategies and other specific approaches backed by evidence has indicated that we are on the right track for our students.

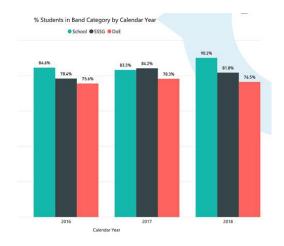
Year 3 Average NAPLAN Score School, SSSG and State 2018.



Year 5

Our College had 55 Students sat the NAPLAN tests in 2018. It is very pleasing to note that:

- as a group, students in Year 5 achieved higher than state averages for every area measured.
- 18% of Year 5 students achieved a Band 9 or 10.
- 73% of Year 5 students achieved in the top two bands for Year 5 level. (Bands 7&8) Graph below.
- Year 5 growth since Year 3 has been pleasing. 65-70% of students at or above expected growth in all areas except Spelling. This is above State and SSSG Growth outcomes, which will be an ongoing focus for Stages 2 and 3 as we seek ways to improve student outcomes.

Student Banking - Support for P&F

Parents please note that student banking via the Commonwealth Bank will be available for students again this year - even for Secondary students. This is a service provided by our P&F volunteers. For each account that is opened, the CBA provide \$5.00 to the P&F.



Student Drop Off in the Morning

Parents please note the College is not officially open in the morning until 7.30 am for K-12 students unless there is a pre-arranged early excursion departure. Students should not be dropped off before this time. Limited playground supervision is provided at 7.30 am. At 7.50 am more staff are allocated playground supervision to manage the arrival of most students from the buses. The drop off for Transition students is not until 7.50 am when there is a dedicated staff member to supervise the students.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award Program 2019

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is operating at Wollondilly Anglican College and some students in Year 9 (aged 14 or older) may wish to join the program. This is an optional activity. The award is a youth self-development program for all young people. It is non-competitive and encourages young people to set and achieve goals at a level appropriate to their needs. There are four sections that must be completed for a young person to qualify for an award:

Community Service, Skills, Recreation and Expedition.

These provide an opportunity for students to acquire and develop skills, initiative and self esteem which will help them become more confident members of the community. The scheme is highly regarded by many employers.

The scheme has three award levels - Bronze, Silver and Gold. To obtain the Bronze award, students must complete the following sections:

1. Service: Voluntary community service spread over three months.

2. Expedition: Complete training and a practice trip and then an expedition with overnight

camping.

3. Skills: Over a three month period, cultural or social activity must be pursued

leading to a deeper knowledge of the subject and the attainment of a

reasonable

degree of skill, eg: playing a musical instrument.

4. Physical Recreation: Participation in one physical activity for a minimum three months, resulting in

some improvement in that activity.

5. All participants must do an extra three months in either, Skill, Physical

Recreation or Service.

The initial cost of the program is \$125.00 (including GST), which pays for insurance and the record book. I hope your son/daughter will take advantage of this opportunity to join the scheme. TEACHING AND LEARNING 7-12

Year 7 Information Evening

Year 11 Information Evening

Year 10 Mathematics Pathways

Mr Hicks (Teaching and Learning Coordinator Mathematics) has spoken to all Year 10 students about the pathways they will be studying this year and the implications for courses in Years 11 and 12. He will also be emailing Parents some very important information as a follow up. Parents are asked to read this carefully and make contact with Mr Hicks if questions arise.

Textbooks and Book packs

Students have now received their Bookpacks and Textbooks. If your child is missing a Textbook, They are to see Mrs Colombo in the Flynn IRC. Students are encouraged to see their Year Patron if they have not received a Bookpack.

Year 11 and 12 Study Periods

Some students in Years 11 and 12 will have study periods. Students should remain in the Flynn IRC for the duration of the period and they are to be working quietly on individual tasks. Students are able to listen to music through their laptop devices, however phones should not be present. Study periods are a great opportunity to work on assignments and study notes, and students are encouraged to make the most of this time.

Course and Elective Changes

At times students may wish to make an adjustment to the courses or Electives they are studying. In these situations, students need to talk to their class teacher, Head of Faculty and myself. It may be possible to swap a course if there is room. A 'Change of Subject' form needs to be completed (available at Student Reception) and returned to Mr Croger for the change to be made. Changes of this nature should be finalised in the first few weeks of the Academic Year.

PASTORAL MATTERS - SENIOR YEARS 9-12

A warm welcome to senior students and parents at the start of a new College Term. I have great anticipation for the year ahead and look forward to supporting you as we move through 2019.

It has been encouraging to see students getting organised and settling into their classes. We promote a 'fresh start' approach: enabling students to reflect on the previous Term and establish new goals with a focus on making positive choices and establishing constructive routines. During whole year group meetings, it has been communicated to students that support IS available to them. We encourage students to engage with their class teachers, roll call teacher, Year Patron or Pastoral Care Coordinator for guidance when needed. Parents, your support in also confirming this message is appreciated.

Year 9-10 Pastoral Care Sessions

The focus for 9-12 Pastoral Care sessions in Term 1 is 'Positivity and Resilience'. Students will explore topics based on mental fitness, personal strengths and relationships. This will include an interactive 'serious game' developed by ReachOut that allows students to navigate a virtual world and identify tools and strategies which can improve and sustain wellbeing. All activities are underpinned by sound psychological principles and research, and are designed as highly engaging, age-appropriate tasks. I encourage you to have a conversation with your son or daughter about this information as the Term progresses.

Year 9-12 Roll Call

Roll call takes place Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings. This is a valuable time for students to build rapport with their roll call teacher and strengthen peer relationships within their particular House group. Roll call groups are also a safe space for students to explore aspects of God's character and His creation through a devotion. Years 9 and 10 will be looking at various themes within Psalms, Year 11 will be working through a study based on six central ideas of the Bible and Year 12 have the opportunity to explore individual devotional studies via The Bible App. At various times students will also have the chance to attend particular seminars relating to health/well-being, study skills and careers.

Year 11 Welcome to the Senior Precinct

It has been encouraging to see Year 11 students transition into the Senior Precinct area with relative ease. They have been welcomed by Year 12 students and enjoyed a sausage sizzle lunch on their first day. Big thanks to the College Captains and Prefects who supported this event by running the BBQ, serving students, providing great tunes and cleaning up.

PASTORAL MATTERS - MIDDLE YEARS 5-8

A Great Start for Year 7

Last week Year 7 were introduced to the wonderful world of the Secondary Years at the College when they took part in our introduction program. A mix of nervousness and excitement was evident as new and old faces moved into the Auditorium to start the day. There was plenty of information for students to digest as staff and systems were introduced throughout the day. One student stated that she felt the hardest part of the day was working out how the locks on their lockers worked.



Something that stood out to me on the day was the way the cohort conducted themselves. At one point I wandered out to the playground at lunch to see a Year 7 student sitting on her own. Before I could get to her another Year 7 student approached her, introduced herself and asked if she would like to join her group of friends. It was a great example of the culture the College works hard to promote amongst our students and was certainly a joy to witness in action.

A big thank you to all of Year 7 for a great start to the year and also to some wonderful staff who contributed to a successful day.

Pastoral Lessons commenced this Week - Self Awareness

This week we kicked off our Pastoral program by looking into the concept of Self-awareness. Being self-aware will help your child tap into his emotional as well as academic intelligence. It will also help your child develop various social relationships through the growing up years and even later in life. Here are some easy and effective ways on developing self-awareness in children

1. Be The Role Model:

To develop self-awareness for children, you have first to be aware of it yourself.

- Use your everyday behaviour to show your child how to manage daily situations in a calm and positive way.
- When faced with an unpleasant or frustrating incident, teach your child how to react in a positive way and deal with the situation.

2. Accept and Recognise Your Child's Emotions:

Understand your child's emotions and never make fun of them, in front of them or themselves.

- Your child's display of emotions will help them control their feelings and also express himself in a better way.
- When your child learns to deal with their emotions, he will learn to accept his behaviour and understand how to function better.

3. Empathise with Your Child:

When you empathize with your child, it will make them feel secure and confident about themselves.

- Empathizing with your child will teach them that their emotions are important and are nothing to be ashamed of or hide.
- Your child may have done poorly in something and be feeling bad about it. Empathizing with them will teach them that they do not always have to be perfect, and it is fine.

5. Pay Attention, Be A Listener and Teach Effective Problem Solving:

Make sure you give enough attention to your child and are a good listener.

- When you pay real attention to your child, it will make them feel loved and wanted, and their sense of worth will also reach a high.
- Help your child to understand how to respond to and not react in certain situations. It is fine if your child loses his cool and bursts out in anger or tears of frustration. Accept it as his natural reaction. However, help them find a better way to deal with the same situation next time.
- Once he does so, make sure you appreciate them for their courage and help them perceive the difference.

Your child will pick up most of his behavioural and social skill sets from you. Be your child's role model and help them understand their potential best.

Welcome back to the routine! I am not sure about you but I am glad to have some order back into our mornings. Please find below some general information regarding Pastoral matters for T-4.

You Can Do It!

I am very excited to announce the You Can Do It! program, which will be taught this year during the Pastoral Period and Buddies session. Your child may have already come home talking about the characters of Ricky Resilience, Oscar Organisation, Pete Persistence, Gabby Get Along and Connie Confidence. If they didn't mention the characters, hopefully they may have spoken to you about what 'success' looks like for them. The aim of the You Can Do It! program is to teach students the attitudes, values and character strengths, and social-emotional skills they will need for their own success, their relationships and their well-being. The program also helps students to understand and overcome the social-emotional blockers (ie the negative thoughts), which might stop them from achieving their potential.

Playground Matters

Morning drop off for K-4 is on the front oval. Students put their bags down at their room and head to the oval. There is no teacher on duty on the oval until 7.50 am so if students are arriving before this time they need to stay under the Shoulder to Shoulder shelter, where there is a teacher on duty from 7.30 am. The teacher who is commencing duty on the oval will collect the students from under the shelter on their way to the oval.

All children in K-4 need to be on the oval and not standing with their parents on the Deakin Terrace. Parents, please support us in this area. This makes it easier for teachers to know where all students are. Parents we also ask that you keep the terrace clear to allow for ease of movement for staff and students.

Afternoon Dismissal

Students in K-4 are dismissed at 2.25 pm under the Shoulder to Shoulder Shelter. There is a section in the T-4 Diary for parents to complete outlining your child's travel arrangements for each afternoon. Please ensure this is completed as soon as possible so your child is in the right place for afternoon dismissal.

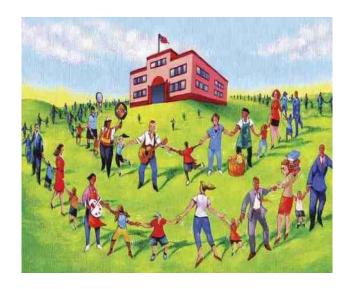

HOST FAMILIES NEEDED

Our sister school in Germany has recommended the following students participate in a three month visit to Wollondilly Anglican College. For this to occur we urgently need host families here at the College. Ideally the student would have their own room and would become part of your family, participating in your daily routines. PDHPE IN 2019

All 7-10 students in PDHPE will receive a cover information letter, outlining the expectations, routines and risks in PDHPE. Each class will go through what is contained within the letter. The cover information letter is to be signed by the student and parent and pasted in the front of the PDHPE workbook. If there are any questions about its contents or PDHPE in general, please do not hesitate to contact your child's classroom teacher or Mr Hewitt (PDHPE Coordinator) at the College.

It is very important that students bring and wear their sports hat during every PE (practical) lesson. This time of year is particularly more problematic with high levels of UV, however, skin damage can occur in other parts of the year as well so hats are to be worn all year round.

In 2019 Year 7 (Stage 4) and Year 9 (Stage 5) are engaging in units that align with the new K-10 PDHPE Syllabus. This Term, students in Year 7 are studying a unit called "Fresh Start" that looks at the components of health and coping with changes and challenges as they start the Secondary Years. In the practical unit, "Building Blocks", students will be further developing and applying their Fundamental Movement Skills (FMS) in a range of different physical activities. Year 9 are starting with a unit on mental health and resiliency, aptly named "Bounce Back" and during practical lessons are examining the concept of attack in team games such as AFL, Oz Tag and Basketball.

Years 8 and 10 are continuing with the outgoing Years 7-10 PDHPE Syllabus with Year 8 looking at fitness and Year 10 focusing on being a wise health consumer and court games.

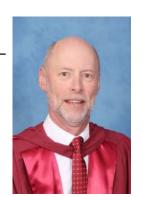

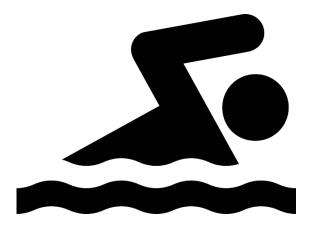

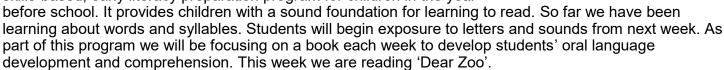




TRANSITION
