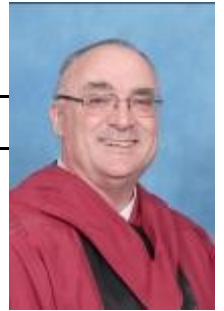

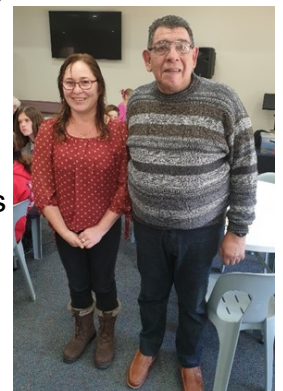
People are often curious as to why staff stay so long at Wollondilly. In these days of transient occupations and ephemeral workplace buy-in (whilst scanning the newspapers for the next better option); our College is certainly a novelty. Forrester Research predicts that today's workers will hold 12 to 15 jobs in their lifetime so we are clearly not contributing much to the trend. Schools are not exempt from statistics. By any measure, a 95% to 100% year to year staff retention rate is an anomaly.

It cannot be put down to any one thing. There is a sense of purpose in serving Christ here but the work is still hard. It is a peaceful location but a long way from big-city attractions. It is a rapidly growing College and that is exciting but equally unnerving, unsettling and discomforting. There are wonderful facilities but we strive hard to pay them off.

My best guess is that it is the staff who attract and retain the staff. Our College endeavours to live out the passage from Romans. As a Headmaster I try to model leadership, tell stories, maintain the Christian ethos and engage and encourage other leaders to do likewise. It is an important role but, when we apply the passage from Romans, no less important, and no more important, than any other staff member. I know a little German but not enough to teach it. I would be the world's worst maintenance worker. Our College needs other skilled people for these things; experts in many areas and it is God who sends us the best of the best. No-one should think more highly of themselves than any other. We are created equal and we all have different gifts. Each relies on the other. Each values the other.

Around a year ago, our Property Manager, Mr Fred Schroder, invited the College contract cleaners to Family Chapel at the College. They could not stay. Undaunted, Fred invited them to his church that Sunday. And so it was that a year ago, Dante (from Chile) and his wife, Nahir (from Paraguay), attended Fred's Church, Tahmoor Baptist.

They kept coming. They have accepted Jesus into their lives and last Sunday were baptised to publicly acknowledge this. Praise God. Ros and I were privileged to be there and to share their joy.

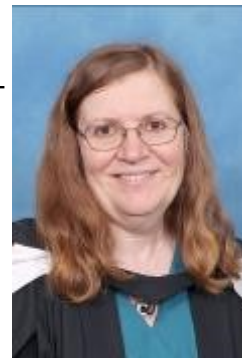


# FAMILY CHAPEL

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## Wollondilly Educational Framework

### Self Regulatory - Self

A sense of self worth, self awareness and personal identity are important attributes of a Wollondilly student. These characteristics aid in developing self regulation (the ability to control oneself). To be an effective learner, students need to be self aware, and self disciplined, having the ability to push through trials and bounce back from disappointments (resilience). In the playground students need to be mindful of the impact they can have on those around them.



Students need to be able to reflect on their decisions and evaluate the outcome of those decisions. At Wollondilly we encourage students to set realistic goals based on an honest evaluation of their strengths and weaknesses. Developing the skill of self regulation is critical for students as they grow towards independence.

Evening. All students and at least one parent of our current Year 8 are expected to be present for this evening. Students are to wear their College Sports Uniform.

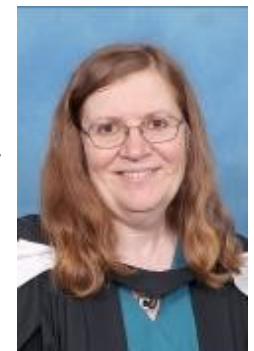

# PASTORAL MATTERS - MIDDLE YEARS 5-8

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## How To Help Your Child Deal With Gossip?

The adolescent years, more than any other period in life, tends to be a time characterised by gossip and rumours. As we all know, gossip spreads like wildfire, especially nowadays with the help of social media and regardless of how innocently a story began, gossip is quickly exaggerated and the truth is distorted. Every teen is at risk of being targeted, even those who try to stay away from all of the drama.

## The Consequences of Gossip

Gossip has a painful impact on a teenager. Its effects can be harmful and long-lasting. Here are a few possible consequences:

- Gossip isolates a teen from his/her peer group, at a time when friends are essential to a teen's well-being and healthy development. It makes them feel like an outsider, with nowhere to turn for help.
- Teens often feel embarrassed and ashamed about the rumours that are circling around their peer group. Not only does this make them doubt themselves, it also can make them feel too uncomfortable to ask an adult for help.
- Low self-confidence. Gossip significantly hurts a teen's self-confidence, which can result in other problems, such as declining grades, poor family relationships and/or a greater likelihood to experiment with drugs or alcohol as a way to cope.
- Teen victims of gossip have an increased risk of depression and even suicide.

## Dealing with Gossip Appropriately

It is so painful, as a parent, to watch our children go through difficult and unfair situations. It's not always easy to know how to help a teen in a way that won't irritate them or make their situation worse, so here are a few tips for helping them cope with gossip and rumours:

- **Validate feelings** - Give your teen the opportunity to vent their frustration over the issue. Reassure them that they are not a bad person.
- **Get to the bottom of the gossip** - Find out the names of the teens who are spreading the gossip, what they are saying and why it is occurring to help clear up misinformation.
- **Contact the College** - Contact the Pastoral Care staff at the College. If the gossip was spread online, keep copies of the interactions.
- **Encourage positive reactions** - When someone hurts us, many of us feel a desire for revenge. Unfortunately, this usually makes conflict worse, so advise your teen to take the high road and stay positive.
- **Teach your teen assertiveness skills** - Teens need to be able to stand up for themselves assertively but not aggressively with confidence when confronted with rumours. Help your teen develop a script that they can use to respond to people. aggressiveness and assertiveness!
- **Provide distraction** - Dwelling on the gossip will make your teen feel worse. Instead, try to get your child involved in outside activities to get your teen's mind off of the problem.
- **Encourage confidence** - Advise your teen to find a friend or two who are loyal and will ignore the gossip. Having the chance to spend time with positive people will lessen the impact of the gossip.
- **Get help** - Watch for signs of emotional distress. Some kids are able to patiently wait for the gossip to die down, while other teens cannot. Pay attention for warnings of eating disorders, self-harm, anxiety or other issues. Do your best to establish a supportive, encouraging home environment. Seek professional help if you begin to notice signs of depression or other mental health problems.

## Final thoughts...

One piece of advice that parents may want to give their teens before they experience hurtful gossip is to be careful about what and with whom, they share information. Private information your teen tells someone, either in person or in texts, emails, or social media, can potentially be used to create rumours.

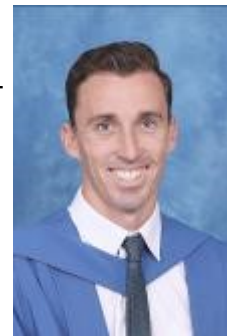

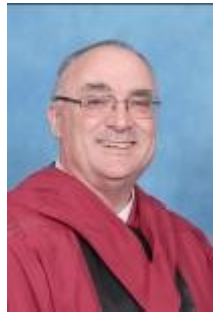
